

# **New Tools for Genetic Improvement**

Last summer, new and exciting tools for genetic improvement were released by the American Angus Association. Angus Genetics Inc (AGI) developed new dollar value indexes (\$Values) for selection of Angus cattle. While genetics may not be as big of a priority for juniors as it is for commercial cattleman, these new additions can benefit everyone in their cattle prioritization.

Kelli Retallick, genetic service director for AGI, says, "The American Angus Association's goal is to provide the members it serves with the best, most up-to-date tools and technology to drive the breed forward to continue to gain market share."

She explains how the indexes can help Angus breeders: "All of these \$Values are built with the commercial industry

in mind.
Each one is built around an underlying breeding goal that affects profitability in certain segments of the industry. To be successful in using these tools, a commercial producer must first set the goal of their operation; second, analyze

the strengths and weaknesses of their herd; and third, use the \$Value that best fits their operation."

It is with these tools that junior breeders can take hold of their cattle herd in and outside of the show ring. They can work to make their cattle more intriguing to potential customers.

"Finding ways to select for profitable genetics can be limited if producers are unable to find the right balancing act among different traits. This is where \$Values, or economic selection indexes, come in to play. \$Values are designed to support producers in choosing the

most profitable animals for their operations by properly weighting these traits [expected

progeny differences (EPDs)] that affect profit based on the role they play in generating revenue or expense," Retallick says.

The commercial side of the industry is what benefits the

most from the new \$Values.
They not only aid commercial breeders in selecting new herd bulls, but also support members in creating seedstock to further meet their commercial customer's needs.

For example, if a commercial producer raises their own replacement heifers

and sells his or her calf crop at weaning time as feeder calves, then using maternal weaned calf value (\$M) or a combination of \$M and weaned calf value (\$W) is a better choice as those \$Values are built with that particular breeding goal in mind. Before you try to manage your herd, though, you need a plan on which to build your program. Then use that plan to plug in genetics that will play a part in your herd.

These new tools brought forth by the Association and AGI are definitely something all members young and old need to look into to build their future, as well as the Angus breed as a whole.
